WVIA Public Media Wins 2 Mid-Atlantic Emmy® Awards

Pittston, PA (WVIA) – On Saturday, Sept. 22, WVIA Public Media won 2 Emmy® Awards during the 30th Annual Mid-Atlantic Emmy® Awards in Philadelphia, PA. The WVIA programs honored were the 2011 Little League® Challenger Exhibition Game and Remembering the Scranton Sirens.

The 2011 Little League Challenger Exhibition Game®, which aired live Aug. 27, 2011 on WVIA-TV, won the Emmy® Award in the category of Outstanding Human Interest Program/Special. Members of WVIA present to accept the award were Bill Kelly, president/executive producer Tom Currá, senior VP/executive producer, Ben Payavis II, producer/director and Kathryn Davies, producer. Other nominees in this category were Long Road Home, WQED Multimedia, Pittsburg, 2012 Shining Stars – The Comcast Sports/Net, Philadelphia and Testimonios, WFMZ-TV, Allentown.

The WVIA Original Documentary Film, *Remembering the Scranton Sirens*, which premiered Oct. 5, 2011 on WVIA-TV, won the Emmy® Award in the Outstanding Documentary category. Members of the production team present to accept the award were Andrew Sordoni, executive producer, Bill Kelly, president/executive producer, Tom Currá, executive producer, Greg Matkosky, creative director of documentary films, Kris Hendrickson, editor, Kathryn Davies, production administrator and Ben Payavis II, production manager. Other nominees in this category were *The Last Chapter* - WQED Multimedia Pittsburg, *Timebomb: Allentown Gas Explosion* - WFMZ-TV Allentown, *Van Gogh* - NBC Philadelphia, and *Rescuing the River: the Raritan* - NJN Public Television, Trenton NJ.

WVIA was also nominated in the category of Outstanding Interview/Discussion Program/Special for its *State of Pennsylvania* episode titled "Are Dikes NEPA's Answer" which aired Sept. 15, 2011 on WVIA-TV.
